Notable Cases

OPG v SC&MC – revocation of lasting powers of attorney and appointment of a panel deputy in a case where the attorney's had not acted in P's best interests.

VT – maintaining a placement out of the local authority area, pursuant to a s21A challenge to a deprivation of liberty.

SHM – complex issues of capacity in an urgent application for conveyance to an alternative placement. The court also considered the restriction of P's social media usage.

Article 2 inquest touching upon the death of Sheila Edwards – representing the family and litigation friend of a motorist who sustained life changing injuries when involved in an accident with another driver, who had failed to self-certify to the DVLA, that he had conditions which might effect his ability to drive safely.
